

PUPILS AMAZING WORK THIS WEEK





In Reception this week, we have been reading "A Place Called Home", which takes the children on a journey, looking inside houses from around the world. We have looked at houses in Greenland, where the children discussed how they would feel living somewhere cold. "If there's snow on the ground it will be

freezing all day" said Jana. "Wear warm clothes to protect from the snow coming down" said Zoe. We also looked at the Maasai people who live on the baking hot grasslands of Kenya. The children then made mud huts using sticks, mud and water like the Maasai people would.

The children all went to the library for the first time this week. Each class spent sometime in the library listening to stories and singing nursery

rhymes. The children then chose their own book to share with their family at home.

We would like to invite all Reception and Year 1 parents to a workshop about phonics, on Wednesday 8th November at 6 pm. We look forward to see you!


What happened to the Ancient Maya Civilisation?

Beautiful water colour river picture painted by Megan and Alanna from Juniper class.






In LKS2 this week we have painted river systems using watercolours and labelled the key features we would find. *Paintings by Aaliyah and Lera from Maple class.*
