

Notification of Price Increase

From 1st April 2022, the price of a school meal will increase to £2.35. We have worked closely with Aspens to ensure that the cost for parents remains as low as possible and we have managed not to increase lunch prices for a significant period, however rising external costs mean that this small increase has now become necessary.

The cost of a school meal is still excellent value for money, with the children being provided with a hot meal of their choosing or a picnic style lunch in addition to a dessert option each day, with special diets and allergies being catered for.

LKS2 took part in a reading workshop with author Michael Catchpool last Friday.


They were shown a variety of new picture books such as Superjoe does NOT like cuddles.


They discussed different and exciting ways of story writing, such as using important aspects of their own lives and unusual events or ideas.



AMAZING ATTENBOROUGH NATURE'S GUARDIAN

ir David Attenborough has been producing documentaries since 1952, capturing the world's eco attention and bringing new species of plant and animal life to the eye of the globe. He has also become a climate protester throughout his career, attending such events as COP26 with Alexander Boris Johnson and her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth the II, ruler and icon of Britain.

Childhood:

Whilst growing up, David lived with his father, his brothers and his sisters, whom were evacuated in WW2. He; although born in Isleworth; grew and lived in Leicester, on the campus of Leicester University College due to his father being the headmaster of the school. His birth date reads the 8th of May, 1926 and he is now an age of 96.

Education:

Fascinated, by Mother Nature's oddities, David was eager to pursue his scholarship at the University of Cambridge studying natural sciences and biology, awarded to him in 1945. As his ideas and curiosity sprouted through the soil of his mind, he gradually became more rooted to nature and life of the world. In 1947, David finally flowered and eventually obtained a degree of natural sciences in the University of Cambridge. Even though David had studied animals and plants for years, he was missing a piece of the puzzle of his curiosity. He craved to meet the specimens he had observed in the eco system they were rooted in.

Later in the journey:

Through his early career, David ventured into continents, discovering their wondrous natural phenomena and species - an odd expedition that no other had seen or successfully documented before. Astonishingly, not only did David record the first sightings of animals but he also documented plants as well. Due to his extensive research, David is thought to be one of the best travelled men in history. Impressively, as Sir David Attenborough has discovered so much he now has over 30 species of animal and plant life named after himself (including the Nepenthes Attenboroughii; a carnivorous plant that devours rats and other small fauna.) Unearthing nature's secrets was an experience that rewarded however an honour that surpassed all of his achievements was a knighthood from the Queen herself in 1985 making him Sir David Fredrick Attenborough.

Achievements and world recognition:


