## English:

Continuing the text Journey to J'burg by Beverley Naidoo which we have been advised by a parent is available free online from scribd.com.

### Read up to an including chapter 7

1. <u>Apartheid: https://www.ducksters.com/history/civil\_rights/apartheid.php</u>

In the first two chapters of the text Naledi, Tiro and Dineo are living away from their mother. South Africa at the time was ruled in a way that non-white people couldn't use libraries, beaches, parks & toilets reserved for white people. This was called apartheid.

- Black & mixed race people were not allowed to go to school together, black Africans were not allowed to vote, whilst minority whites voted for all of South Africa
- Non-whites had to have a special 'pass' if they wanted to travel.
- The Land Act prevented black people from owning land except in reserved areas, and meant that many black parents were forced to work in the cities and towns as labourers & servants, living away from their children.

Can you imagine living apart from your parents or carers for most of your childhood? Make notes about how you would feel and what effects it would have on their lives.

Now read the attached Donald Woods article and underline key events. (Attached)

Imagine you are a reporter and write questions that they would like to ask the subject of the article.

#### 2. <u>Read Chapter 8 to chapter 10.</u>

Make notes on what has happened to Grace and what she has witness first hand. Pretending you are Naledi write down the questions that you may want to ask Grace as you fall asleep.

Answer one of your questions P.E.E. in the answer. (Make a **Point**, **Explain** the point and use **Evidence** from the text).

### 3. Freedom

As a child you have the following freedoms:

- Living with your parents/guardians
- Advancing your education
- Having choices about what you learn in school

Choose one of these freedoms, as you know Naledi doesn't have any of these freedoms. Consider the reasons why she should and plan a speech to the South African Government explain why Naledi should have the same freedom as you. Once you have completed your plan, write your speech.

### 4. Read chapters 11 to 15

Whilst reading the chapters consider the following:

- What has Naledi discovered on the journey?
- How does she feel about her Government?
- Who does she admire and Why?
- What options are available to her?

Considering all of the above and understanding Naledi as a resilient, determined character, Naledi is considering whether she should travel to the UK to further her own education. If she becomes educated to a higher level she may come back to South Africa and try to influence the government.

### 5. Writing dialogue

Following yesterday's work I am pleased to confirm that Naledi had decided to come to England to further her education. She has just arrived at a British station and you are meeting for the first time because she is going to stay at your house. As you begin your walk home what things might you discuss?

- Transport for Black and White
- Shops
- Public toilets
- Greeting
- Police

Choose one of them and write the dialogue between you and Naledi remember how different they will seem to Naledi based on the apartheid information you know about South Africa.

Don't forget the punctuation for dialogue and how to include some action to move the discussion along.
